PERU 2023

September 3. Our outbound flight from Schiphol Airport (September 1, Amsterdam, Netherlands) to Madrid (Spain, IB3725) was delayed. We missed our connecting flight to Lima (Peru, IB6653). Arranged new flights in Madrid, and were transferred to a hotel where we arrived at dawn. Slept from 05.00 to 09.00. The hotel is close to the Madrid airport, in a desolate, dirty and run down area. Left the hotel at 18.45. Collected our luggage at "Missed connections", and changed terminals to catch the flight to Lima with Air Europe. Spilled our time with shop gazing, and I bought a watch. We occupied the last row of uncomfortable seats in the Airbus Dreamliner. Enjoyed turbulence, a huge cup of wine, and movies (The Hobbit, Mummies, and The house).

Arrived at Lima at 04.30, collected our luggage, met the guide Carlos Altamirano, and went to Pantanos de Villa, a coastal nature reserve. Birds included Grey Gull, Inca Tern, Peruvian Pelican, Peruvian Booby, Black Skimmer, Many-colored Rush-Tyrant, and a few Bottlenose Dolphins.



Next we visited Pucusana Island, birds including Blue-footed Booby, Red-footed and Guanay Cormorants, Humboldt Penguin and (Peruvian) Seaside Cinclodes. Lunch and instant coffee.




Afternoon visit to the Lurin River, just outside Lima. Small and polluted, but great views of Pacific Parrotlets. From 14.00-16.00 we drove to our hotel. Driving in Lima requires patience, speed bumps not uncommon. Enjoyed a beer in the hotel garden, meanwhile having great views of a Croaking Ground Dove. Cold and windy, elevation about 1100 meter.

September 4. Left the hotel at 05.20 and returned about 18.45. Day spent in the Santa Eulalia Valley, up to 3100 meter. Best sighting was an adult male Andean Condor at the end of the day. Perched on a rock, about 20-25 meter above the road. Although the light was poor, the Condor took off and flew just over our heads into the valley. Incredible views. Roads mostly unsealed, dry, and amazing vegetation including "hanging cacti", i.e. curtains of cacti on mountain sides, meters long, on mountain slopes bordering rivers. Lunch in a small Andean town, one knife short. Vegetarian food seems not a key priority, US-sized portions, rice served in pudding molds.



September 5. Santa Eulalia Valley. Spectacular views at 4935 meter, I suffered modestly from altitude sickness. Best bird was a Diademed Plover at about 4750 meter. At our first roadside stop we used walking poles. Steep climb uphill, a distant White-cheeked Cotinga. During the day we saw six species of Ground Tyrants. Nice and sunny, cold. Beanies, legging, scarves and mittens. Mario, the driver, prepared a roadside lunch, fried chicken, but I had no appetite. Didn't sleep much last night, hotel at 3200 meter. Dinner of vermicelli-enriched vegie soup, pancakes, and a bottle of beer.



September 6. Excellent start of the day. Carlos, our guide, needed immodium, and the car had a flat tire. Left at 07.15, followed by driving into the Santa Eulalia Valley. Drove up to about 4960 meter. Walking uphill was a bit easier than yesterday, again after a poor night. Great scenery, Andean Swift, Rufous-bellied Seedsnipe, Andean Swift, and a family of Northern Mountain Viscachas. Driving back

to the hotel for lunch was considerably delayed due to road constructions. Despite a large plate of vegetable soup and a huge mug of coffee, still no need to go for a pee after 3 hours of driving to Lima. Back to sea level, food tasting fine again.



September 7. Early flight to Cuzco (06.10 departure, LA2011). Picked up by Silverio Duri, our guide and a driver. Birding at the slowly drying and dying lake at Huacarpay near Cuzco. Arid montane vegetation was more spectacular than the birds. Several pre-inca ruins. Roadside stops produced a Helmeted Mountaineer. Pretty warm. Arrived at Ollantaytambo around 15.00. A tourist trap, with a local square surrounded by bars and restaurants. Afternoon birding in the hotel garden produced

two species of Trainbearers, Green-and-white Hummingbird, Rusty Flowerpiercer, Black-headed Grosbeak, etc.

September 8. During breakfast Annelien and I had excellent views of a second Helmeted Mountaineer. At 09.50 we boarded the train to Cuzco, about 1.5 hours. Upon arrival, our local guide didn't turn up. Since we had tickets for the 11.00 o'clock bus, we decided to take the bus to Machu Picchu ourselves. Backpacks were not allowed and had to be stored. A friendly local guide, Olga, gave us a guided tour. There are apparently 4 walking routes (to reduce the tourist burden), and she changed ours which required a few stamps. Altogether, Machu Picchu is a remarkable experience, about 40% still covered with forest. The weather was great. Return to Cuzco by bus went smoothly, where we had a pre-arranged but very late lunch at 15.30. Andean vegetable soup. Train back at 18.15 was an experience, with music, dance, and a fashion show by the train crew.



September 9. Breakfast at 05.30, left at 06.00. Driving over the Abra Malaga pass (4343 meter) to enter the cloud forest at the wet East slope of the Andes. No cacti anymore, first tree ferns, *Cycas* palms, and shrubs and low trees full of lichens and moss. Spring, many flowers. Displaying Marcapata Spinetails and great views of a Diademed Tapaculo. Mountain tanagers and hummingbirds. Roadside

lunch, still suffering from cramps. Fog set in about 15.00. Dinner in Ollantaytambo, our last night in Tunupa lodge.

September 10. A travel day. By minibus via Cuzco to Many. First hour was spent at the hummingbird feeders of Ensisera Camp. A female Giant Hummingbird and a male Black-tailed Trainbearer. This part of the Andes suffers from introduced non-native trees such as Eucalyptus, Pine and Fir, which disturb the otherwise great scenery. Lunch at Actanao. Early afternoon the birds were not response, but later we saw Mountain tanagers and Andean Parakeets. An unidentified Mountain Toucan flew off. Overnight stay at the Wayquecha lodge at Paucartambo.



September 11. Breakfast at 06.00, left at 06.30. Birding at the lodge produced an Urubamba Antpitta. Roadside birding produced two Chestnut-crowned Cotingas, joined by a Red-crested Cotinga. Great views of a Grey-breasted Mountain Toucan. In the afternoon we drove from nearly 3000 meter to 1500 meter. Especially the last part of the descend was scary. Nearly dark, road constructions by a Chinese road workers, combined with heavy traffic that forced us to reverse occasionally to allow passing. Edges of roads were re-enforced with white plastic bags filled with sand, which are then covered (or better hidden) with tarmac, which doesn't give the impression of a robust and permanent solution. Arrived at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge at 18.00. Wifi doesn't work, good food. Electrical equipment can be charged in the main building between 18.00 and 21.00.

September 12. Breakfast at 06.00, birding in the garden. Several species of (new) Hummingbirds, and 4 mammal species, including a Tayra catching bananas from the feeder. Also 4 males Cock-of-the-Rock. Major road constructions ongoing. Visited a lek of Andean Cock-of-the-Rocks. Noisy. The males look either red or orange, depending on the angle of the incoming light. Rain at 16.00. Our house has a leaky roof and a curtain fell down. The entire lodge lacks maintenance. Upon arrival at the main

entrance, we saw a tree falling down on the roof of one of the cottages. Most surprising perhaps, the entire cottage doesn't have a single mosquito screen, and not a single window can be opened.



September 13. Breakfast at 06.00, left at 06.30 for roadside birding. Many trucks, tough birding. Later on the birds became more responsive. Afternoon visit at the Inka-Macomia Hummingbird feeding station.



A few new birds, and excellent views of a King Vulture from a hide. I was the first to enter the hide and took a few pictures before the vulture flew off. A Greater Potoo during the last road side stop. Our cottage in Gallito de la Rocas has mosquito screens. Warm and humid, elevation about 400-500 meter.

September 14. Visited Pico de Hoz, a garden with hummingbird and fruit feeders. Several new species of Hummingbirds, a black-throated Toucanet, Undulated Tinamou and an Amazonian Antpitta, Squirrel Monkeys, etc. From 09.00 to 16.00 travelled by boat on the Madres de Dios, shallow (dry season), requiring careful navigating around the numerous pebble islands. Horned Screamers, Terns, and –surprisingly- a pair of Burrowing Owls. Men on pebble islands were sawing Mahogany trees. Arrived at the Manu Birding lodge, a pretty rundown place, birding in the garden. Suffering from coughing fits, mostly at night.







September 15. Breakfast at 06.00, birding from 06.30 on the trails near the lodge. Birds included Pavonine Quetzal and Razor-billed Curassow. According to Silverio, this region is flooded for a couple of months during the wet season, which probably explains why the forest is quite "open". Cloudy in the morning, sun in the afternoon. Stumbled and fell on my right knee end of the morning, painful at night. A clay lick with fresh Tapir tracks. At night had to wake-up Annelien, I couldn't find my torch and got stuck in the mosquito.



September 16. This morning we were still at the Manu Birding lodge, were we had amazing views of Emperor Tamarins at the fruit feeders along the river. Walked from about 06.30 to 13.15, about 8.2 km in total. Again Tapir tracks, a little frog and an unidentified False Coral Snake sp. Tired, coughing last night produced green stuff. Sunny day, best bird was a shy Pavonine Cuckoo and two species of Toucans. Left at 15.30 by boat, including the cooking crew. Our first albeit distant Sungrebe of the tour and (torch-lit) eyes of Spectacled Cayman. Arrived at 17.00 at the Tambo Blanquillo lodge. Everything seems well maintained and doesn't fall apart, incomparable with the previous lodge.



September 17. Again a poor night. Yesterday evening Annelien had six ticks, one was a real monster. Our special tweezers were too small, possibly a Tapir tick. Annelien is also covered with red and itching bumps, likely caused by chiggers. Treated with alcohol. Left at 05.00 by boat, than walked to the clay lick. Huge "hide", even separate male and female "toilets". Again we were the only visitors. After the COVID pandemic, Peru is politically not very stable, which scares off tourists. The clay lick is massive, and we saw amongst others about fifty Red-and-Green Macaws, Mealy and Yellow-fronted Amazons (common), Blue-headed and Orange-eared Parrots (less common), and Cobalt-winged and Tui Parakeets. When we walked back to the boat, we saw a pair of Amazonian Parrotlets, for sure the best bird of the day. Incredibly difficult to spot these small and green parrots within the vegetation. At about 11.00 we were back at the lodge, hot and humid. Afternoon nap and washing. Great views of a male Festive Coquette along the trail to the main service building. Afternoon trail walking.



September 18. Breakfast at 05.30, morning hours spent on a boat on Cocha Blanca, an oxbow lake. From about 08.00 hot and humid, sunny. Part of the trip accompanied by a habituated Black Cayman. Back at 11.00, nap. Silverio showed me a Pauraque, that nearly bumped into me when flying off. Also a large unidentified snake, 2-3 meter, grey with yellow, bloody fast. At the end of the day we went to Cocha Camino, an oxbow lake, and canopy tower. Climbed the 40 meter canopy tower. Best constructed canopy tower I have ever seen, great views but no birds.



September19. Puerto Maldonado. Back to "civilization". Travelling by motor bike or trike to the boat. Nice views of a Capybara family along the river bank. Three hours by boat (pee stop on a river island produced about seventy parrotlets, most Tui and a few Cobalt-winged) that seemed to be eating sand. About one-and-a -half hour by car or taxi over a narrow and unpaved dirt road, with plenty of scary "bridges" made from parallel tree trunks, most intact. More people, more waste, fat people on motor bikes, traffic, deforestation, civilization. Warm and humid. Rain started at 16.30. First real rain in 3 weeks of travelling. A ferry over the Rio Inambari, followed by 120 km by car to Puerto Maldonado. Two Palm Creepers at the outskirts. Hotel with airco. Treating numerous itching bumps of Annelien with alcohol.



This was our first and likely also our last tour that was 'organized' by BirdingBreaks, a Dutch tour operator. Apart from the chaotic and misleading itinerary, outdated checklist, and shaky flight arrangements, the lack of bottled oxygen (medical precaution at high altitude) reflects a lack of concern about clients' safety. We were offered 750 euro compensation each on a following trip. Both local guides were outstanding.

Puna Teal Spatula puna – About 10 near Cuzco.
Cinnamon Teal Spatula cyanoptera – Common at Pantanos de Villa, a male near Cuzco.
White-cheeked Pintail Anas bahamensis – At least 10 at Pantanos de Villa.
Yellow-billed Pintail Anas georgica – Seen near Cuzco.
Yellow-billed Teal Anas flavirostris – Common in the Andes.

Andean Teal Anas andium – Common in the Andes.

Andean Duck Oxyura ferruginea – Common in the Santa Eulalia Valley. A few near Cuzco.

Speckled Chachalaca Ortalis guttata – A few in the lowlands.

Razor-billed Curassow Mitu tuberosum – Four or five near Tambo Blanquillo.

Great Potoo *Nyctibius grandis* - One near the Inka-Macomia Hummingbird feeding station. **Andean Potoo** *Nyctibius maculosus* – One near the Wayquecha lodge.

Pauraque Nyctidromus albicollis – One at Tambo Blanquillo.Sand-colored Nighthawk Chordeiles rupestris – About eight roosting on driftwood, Madres de Dios.



APODIDAE

Chestnut-collared Swift Streptoprocne rutile – Common in the Andes.
White-collared Swift Streptoprocne zonaris – As previous species.
Pale-rumped Swift Chaetura egregia – A handful at Tambo Blanquillo.
Short-tailed Swift Chaetura brachyura – One at Tambo Blanquillo.
Andean Swift Aeronautes andecolus- Common in the Santa Eulalia Valley and Cuzco area.

Neotropical Palm Swift *Tachornis squamata* – A few in the lowlands.

Wire-crested Thorntail Discosura popelairii – Great views of a pair at Wayquecha. Rufous-crested Coquette Lophornis delattrei – A male at the feeders of Inka-Macomia. Butterfly Coquette Lophornis verreauxii – Great views of a pair at Tambo Blanquillo.

Band-tailed Pigeon Patagioenas fasciata – Seen in low numbers at Abra Malaga.
Pale-vented Pigeon Patagioenas cayennensis – About twenty near Tambo Blanquillo.
Plumbeous Pigeon Patagioenas plumbea – Singles at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Ruddy Pigeon Patagioenas subvinacea – Heard at Manu.
Croaking Ground Dove Columbina cruziana – Two near Lima.
Bare-faced Ground Dove Metriopelia ceciliae – About 10 in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Black-winged Ground Dove Metriopelia melanoptera – In the Santa Eulalia Valley and near Cuzco.
Grey-fronted Dove Leptotila rufaxilla – One in the lowlands.

Eared Dove Zenaida auriculata – Common during the first week of the tour. **West Peruvian Dove** Zenaida meloda – At least 10 at Pantanos de Villa.

Sungrebe Heliornis fulica – Best views were those of a female at Cocha Blanco.

Common Gallinule Gallinula galeata – Common at Pantanos de Villa and Huacarpay.
Giant Coot Fulica gigantea – About twenty in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Andean Coot Fulica ardesiaca – One at Pantanos de Villa and three at Huacarpay.
Rufous-sided Crake Laterallus melanophaius – Heard at Tambo Blanquillo.

ARAMIDAE Limpkin Aramus guarauna – One flying over Cocha Blanco.

CIDONIIDAE

Wood stork Mycteria americana – As previous species.

PODICIPEDIDAE

White-tufted Grebe *Rollandia rolland* – One at Huacarpay. Silvery Grebe *Podiceps occipitalis* – Distant views of two birds in the Santa Eulalia Valley. **Least Grebe** *Tachybaptus dominicus* – About five at the oxbox lakes.

Chilean Flamingo *Phoenicopterus chilensis* – Seen at Pantanos de Villa and Huacarpay.

HAEMATOPODIDAE

American Oystercatcher *Haematopus palliates* – About 10 at Pantanos de Villa. Blackish Oystercatcher *Haematopus ater* – A handful at Pacusana Island.



RECURVIROSTRIDAE

Black-necked Stilt *Himantopus mexicanus* – One at Huacarpay.

CHARADRIIDAE

Southern Lapwing Vanellus chilensis – A few along the Madres de Dios.
Andean Lapwing Vanellus resplendens – Widely distributed in the Andes but not common.
Killdeer Charadrius vociferus – Three at Pantanos de Villa.
Collared Plover Charadrius collaris – One at Madres de Dios.
Pied Plover Hoploxypterus cayanus – One at Madres de Dios.
Diademed Plover Phegornis mitchellii – One at about 4750 meter in the Santa Eulalia Valley.



JACANIDAE Wattled Jacana Jacana jacana – A few at the oxbox lakes.

Wilson's Phalarope Phalaropus tricolor – About 10 at Pantanos de Villa.
Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius – Common at Pantanos de Villa and Madres de Dios.
Solitary Sandpiper Tringa solitaria – A few along the rivers.
Lesser Yellowlegs Tringa flavipes – One at Pantanos de Villa.

LARIDAE

Black Skimmer Rynchops niger – Seen at Pantanos de Villa and Madres de Dios.
Andean Gull Chroicocephalus serranus – Common at rivers and lakes in the Andes.
Grey-headed Gull Chroicocephalus cirrocephalus- Common at the coast near Lima.
Grey Gull Leucophaeus modestus – Common at the coast near Lima.
Belcher's Gull Larus belcheri – Common near Lima.



Kelp Gull Larus dominicanus- As previous species.

Yellow-billed Tern *Sternula superciliaris* – Common along the rivers in the lowlands.

Large-billed Tern Phaetusa simplex – As previous species.

Inca Tern *Larosterna inca* – Common at the coast near Lima.



SPHENISCIDAE Humboldt Penguin Spheniscus humboldti – Five on the rocks near Pacusana Island.



CICONIIDAE

Wood Stork Mycteria americana – One at the oxbow lakes.

SULIDAE

Peruvian Booby *Sula variegate* – Common at the coast near Lima. **Blue-footed Booby** *Sula nebouxii* – A handful well seen at Pucusana island.



ANHINGIDAE **Anhinga** *Anhinga anhinga* – A few at the oxbox lakes.

PHALACROCORACIDAE

Red-legged Cormorant Phalacrocorax gaimardii – Common at Pucusana Island.

White-capped Dipper Cinclus leucocephalus – Two in the Santa Eulalia Valley.



PASSERIDAE

House Sparrow Passer domesticus – Common near Lima.

MOTACILLIDAE

Puna Pipit Anthus brevirostris – One at the Abra Malaga pass.

FRINGILLIDAE

Olivaceous Siskin Spinus olivaceus – A flock of about 10 near the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Hooded Siskin Spinus magellanicus – A few in the Santa Eulalia Valley and near Cuzco.
Black Siskin Spinus atratus – As previous species.
Yellow-rumped Siskin Spinus uropygialis – See previous species.
Golden-bellied Euphonia Euphonia chrysopasta – A single male at Tambo Blanquillo.
Bronze-green Euphonia Euphonia minuta – A few at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
White-vented Euphonia Euphonia minuta – A male at Tambo Blanquillo.
Orange-bellied Euphonia Euphonia xanthogaster – Common in the lowlands
Rufous-bellied Euphonia Euphonia rufiventris – A male and female at Tambo Blanquillo.

PASSERELLIDAE

Yellow-throated Bush Tanager Chlorospingus flavigularis – A few at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Yellow-browed Sparrow Ammodramus aurifrons – Two at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Pectoral Sparrow Arremon taciturnusi – One at Manu.
Rufous-collared Sparrow Zonotrichia capensis – Common.
Rusty-bellied Brushfinch Atlapetes nationii – Common in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Grey-eared (Black-faced) Brushfinch Atlapetes melanolaemus – Three at Wayquecha.
Cuzco Brushfinch Atlapetes canigenis – Great views at Abra Malaga.

ICTERIDAE

Russet-backed Oropendola Psarocolius angustifrons – Common in the lowlands.
Dusky-green Oropendola Psarocolius atrovirens – Seen at Wayquecha and Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Crested Oropendola Psarocolius decumanus – One at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Olive Oropendola Psarocolius bifasciatus – Common at Manu.
Yellow-rumped Cacique Cacicus cela – Common in the lowlands.
Southern Mountain Cacique Cacicus chrysonotus – One at Wayquecha.
Casqued Oropendola (Casqued Cacique) Cacicus oseryi – A few at Manu.
Giant Cowbird Molothrus oryzivorus – A few in the lowlands.
Shiny Cowbird Molothrus bonariensis – Two in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Scrub Blackbird Dives warczewiczi – Common near Lima and one in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Yellow-winged Blackbird Agelasticus thilius – Common near Cuzco.
Pale-eyed Blackbird Agelasticus xanthophthalmus – About 10 at Tambo Blanquillo.
Yellow-hooded Blackbird Chrysomus icterocephalus – Common near Lima.

Orange-backed Troupial Icterus croconotus – A few at Tambo Blanquillo.



PARULIDAE

Citrine Warbler Myiothlypis luteoviridis – Two at Abra Malaga. Two-banded Warbler Myiothlypis bivittate – One at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. Cuzco Warbler Myiothlypis chrysogaster – Seen near Pico de Hoz. Three-banded (Three-striped) Warbler Basileuterus trifasciatus – A few in the lowlands. Slate-throated Whitestart Myioborus miniatus – As previous species. Spectacled Whitestart Myioborus melanocephalus – Three at Abra Malaga.

CARDINALIDAE

Red-crowned Ant Tanager Habia rubica – A female at Manu.
Golden Grosbeak Pheucticus chrysogaster – At least 10 in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Black-backed Grosbeak Pheucticus aureoventris – Common in the Cuzco area.



THRAUPIDAE

Great Inca Finch *Incaspiza pulchra* – A handful in the Santa Eulalia Valley. **Green Honeycreeper** *Chlorophanes spiza* – A few in the Andes and Iowlands. Mourning Sierra Finch Rhopospina fruticeti – Common in the Santa Eulalia Valley.



Yellow-backed Tanager Hemithraupis flavicollis – A few at Manu. **Swallow Tanager** *Tersina viridis* – A few in the foothills and lowlands. Purple Honeycreeper Cyanerpes caeruleus – A few in the Andes and the lowlands. Blue Dacnis Dacnis cayana – A few males at Manu. Yellow-bellied Dacnis Dacnis flaviventer – A few at Manu. **Black-faced Dacnis** *Dacnis lineata* – A male at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. Greyish (Blue-grey) Saltator Saltator coerulescens – A few singles at Tambo Blanquillo. Buff-throated Saltator Saltator maximus – Seen in Andes and lowlands. **Golden-billed Saltator** Saltator aurantiirostris – A few in the Santa Eulalia Valley. **Bananaquit** *Coereba flaveola* – A few throughout the tour. Black-goggled Tanager Trichothraupis melanops – A male at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. **Yellow-crested Tanager** Loriotus rufiventer – A male when travelling to Gallito de la Rocas. White-winged Shrike-Tanager Lanio versicolor – A female at Manu. Masked Crimson Tanager Ramphocelus nigrogularis – Two at Cocha Camino. Silver-beaked Tanager Ramphocelus carbo – Common in the lowlands. **Black-and-white Seedeater** Sporophila luctuosa – Three females at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. **Chestnut-bellied Seed Finch** *Sporophila angolensis* – A male at Manu. Chestnut-throated Seedeater Sporophila telasco – A female near Lima. White-browed Hemispingus Kleinothraupis auricularis – Three at Abra Malaga. Parodi's Hemispingus Kleinothraupis parodii – Four at Abra Malaga. Black-eared Hemispingus Sphenopsis melanotis – One at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. **Rust-and-yellow Tanager** *Thlypopsis ruficeps* – A few at Abra Malaga. Superciliaried Hemispingus Thlypopsis superciliaris – Two between Cuzco and Many. **Rufous-chested Tanager** *Thlypopsis ornate* – Three at Abra Malaga. **Chestnut-breasted Mountain Finch** *Poospizopsis Caesar* – A single male at Abra Malaga. Three-striped Hemispingus Microspingus trifasciatus – Four at Abra Malaga. **Capped Conebill** *Conirostrum albifrons* – Two near Wayquecha. **Cinereous Conebill** Conirostrum cinereum – Common in the Santa Eulalia Valley, a few near Cuzco. Bright-rumped Yellow Finch Sicalis uropigyalis – Five seen in the Santa Eulalia Valley. **Saffron Finch** *Sicalis flaveola* – A pair on the pavement of Puerto Maldonado. **Grassland Yellow Finch** *Sicalis luteola* – Two in the Santa Eulalia Valley. Greenish Yellow Finch Sicalis olivascens – As previous species. Peruvian Sierra Finch Phrygilus punensis – Three in the Santa Eulalia Valley and one at Abra Malaga. Ash-breasted Sierra Finch Geospizopsis plebejus – Two in the Santa Eulalia Valley.

White-winged Diuca (Glacier) Finch Idiopsar speculifer – In total 4 seen in the Santa Eulalia Valley.
Band-tailed Seedeater Catamenia analis – Common in the Santa Eulalia Valley and near Cuzco.
Masked Flowerpiercer Diglossa cyanea – Common at Abra Malaga.
Rusty Flowerpiercer Diglossa sittoides – A male and female near Cuzco.
Moustached Flowerpiercer Diglossa mystacalis – Four at Abra Malaga.
Black-throated Flowerpiercer Diglossa brunneiventris - Seen daily in low numbers in the Andes.
Yellow-throated Tanager Iridosornis analis – One when travelling to Gallito de la Rocas.
Golden-collared Tanager Iridosornis jelskii – A male at Wayquecha lodge.
Blue-and-yellow Tanager Rauenia bonariensis – Seen on three days in the Andes.
Chestnut-bellied Mountain Tanager Dubusia castaneoventris – A male at Abra Malaga.
Hooded Mountain Tanager Buthraupis montana – A few in the Wayquecha area.



Blue-capped Tanager *Sporathraupis cyanocephala* – Four at Wayquecha. **Grass-green Tanager** *Chlorornis riefferii* – One when travelling to Wayquecha lodge.



Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager Anisognathus igniventris – Four at Abra Malaga.



Orange-eared Tanager Chlorochrysa calliparaea – One at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. Orange-throated Tanager Wetmorethraupis sterrhopteron – Three at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge. Magpie Tanager Cissopis leverianus – Seen on three days in the lowlands.



Red-capped Cardinal Paroaria gularis – Seen on three days in the lowlands.
Spotted Tanager Ixothraupis punctata – A few at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Yellow-bellied Tanager Ixothraupis xanthogastra – One in the Wayquecha area.
Blue-grey Tanager Thraupis episcopus – A few during the first part of the tour.
Palm Tanager Thraupis palmarum – A few in the foothills and lowlands.
Blue-necked Tanager Stilpnia cyanicollis – Five at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.

Beryl-spangled Tanager *Tangara nigroviridis* – One at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.



Bay-headed Tanager Tangara gyrola – A few at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Golden-eared Tanager Tangara chrysotis – A handful at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Saffron-crowned Tanager Tangara xanthocephala – Two at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Green-and-gold Tanager Tangara schrankii – Single males at Manu and Tambo Blanquillo.
Golden Tanager Tangara arthus – A handful at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
Turquoise Tanager Tangara mexicana – Several in the lowlands.
Paradise Tanager Tangara chilensis – Common in the lowlands.



MAMMALS

CALLITRICHIDAE

Saddle-back Tamarin Saguinus fuscicollis - At Manu Birding lodge. Emperor Tamarin Saguinus imperator – At least five at the feeders of Tambo Blanquillo lodge.

CEBIDAE

Shock-headed Capucin *Cebus cuscinus* – Two briefly seen at Tambo Blanquillo. **Bolivian Squirrel Monkey** *Saimiri boliviensis* – Seen at Manu.



Brown Titi Monkey *Plecturocebus brunneus* – One along the Madres de Dios. **Large-headed Capuchin** *Sapajus macrocephalus* – At Cock-of-the-Rock and Tambo Blanquillo.



ATELIDAE

Colombian Red Howler Monkey *Alouatta seniculus* – Seen along the Madres de Dios. Black-faced Spider Monkey *Ateles chamek* – Seen in the lowlands. Gray Woolly Monkey Lagothrix lagothricha – Four at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.

CAVIDAE

Montane Guinea Pig Cavia tschudii – Three in the Cuzco area. Capybara Hydrochoerus hydrochaeris – A family at the river bank near Tambo Blanquillo.



DASYPROCTIDAE

Brown Agouti Dasyprocta variegate – One at the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.

CHINCHILLIDAE

Northern Mountain Viscacha Lagidium peruanum – A family in the in the Santa Eulalia Valley.

DELPHINIDAE

Bottlenose Dolphin Tursiops truncates – At least ten at Pantanos de Villa.

TAYASSUIDAE

White-lipped Peccary Tayassu pecari – Five at Tambo Blanquillo, another 100 or so heard.

CANIDAE

Andean Fox Lycalopex culpaeus – One when travelling to Wayquecha lodge.

MUSTELIDAE

Tayra *Eira barbara* – Singles at the Cock-of-the-Rock and Tambo Blanquillo lodges.



Giant Otter Pteronura brasiliensis – Four at Cocha Blanco. Resembling seals.



OTARIIDAE South American Sea Lion Otaria flavescens – At least ten at Pucusana Island.

ECHIMYDAE

Amazon Bamboo Rat Catylomys dactylinus – Heard at Tambo Blanquillo.

SCLURIDAE **Bolivian Squirrel** *Sciurus ignites* – Two at the feeders of the Cock-of-the-Rock lodge.
